Wine Blessing with Special Wishes: "To Life" Qi<u>ddush</u> l'-<u>H</u>aiyim - קדוש לְחַיִּים

Leader:

Red wine and grape juice make people happy and we drink them on Shabbat, and at other special times like holidays and weddings.

So when we drink red wine and grape juice, we think of happy times and we wish for more happy times for everyone.

Before we drink our wine or juice on Shabbat or other special times, we wish for everyone to have a good life.

by raising our cups together and saying these special words: "To Life!"

In Hebrew the words "To Life!" are said "L'-Haiyim!" Let's try that together:

"Breaking Bread" & Sharing Help Make the World Better & Peaceful

When we share and eat food with other people we are "breaking bread" with them.

Sharing food and other good things with people is a good way to help us all to get to know each other and to get along nicely with each other.

This kind of sharing is one way that our Jewish great-great-grandparents,

& their parents before them, made friends & made peace - shalom - with their neighbors.

Every day, including on Shabbat, we can share food or "break bread"

with many kinds of people to make friends and make the world better and more peaceful.

We know that there are hungry people all over the world.

So each time we eat, we are lucky to have food, and we can feel thankful or grateful to all the people who made the food we eat -

to all our parents and the farmers and the many workers who feed the world - and we can share our food and many other good things with others.

Now let's all wish for peace - shalom - and share some special *hallah* bread.

Let's all say "shalom" together now: "Shalom!" שַׁלוֹםַוּ

"Shalom" means "peace" and that's what we wish for all the world.

(All share some <u>hall</u>ah, or a symbolic pinch of it is eaten by someone & everyone else eats some after the service.)

Shabbat Shalom - A Sabbath of Peace

The Shabbat candles are so pretty and light up our special day, the Shabbat. We feel good getting together on Shabbat, sharing our juice and special <u>hallah</u> bread, and now we will wish each other a Sabbath or "Shabbat of peace": "Shabbat Shalom."

All turn to each other and shake hands or give hugs and say:

שַבַּת שָׁלוֹםַ! !Shabbat Shalom

We are now going to end our little Shabbat party with a song with those same words: "Shabbat Shalom."

The song goes like this:

Shabbat Shalom (clap), Shabbat Shalom (clap),

Shabbat Shabbat Shabbat Shabbat Shalom! (clap), (repeat from beginning then go on)

Shabbat Shabbat Shabbat Shabbat Shabbat Shabom! (repeat once then go back to 1st part)
