Barry Lynn of Americans United to Appear at Machar

Want to learn more about separation of church and state from someone who has been at the forefront of the battle? Then come to Machar's adult education session at 10 a.m. on Sunday, Feb. 7, at the Jewish Primary Day School to hear a talk by Barry Lynn, executive director of Americans United for Separation of Church and State.

Americans United defines itself as "a nonpartisan educational organization dedicated to preserving the constitutional principle of church-state separation as the only way to ensure religious freedom for all Americans."

The organization's work includes fighting against taxpayer subsidies for religious schools, opposing the teaching of creationism in public schools and fighting the White House's "faith-based initiative" started by former president George W. Bush.

On Feb. 7 — "Darwin Day" — Lynn will discuss partisan politicking by religious organizations, taxpayer funded religious ministries and missions, religious claims seeking to trump civil rights laws and public duties, and presidential campaigning that often treats the role of president as a national preacher. He will also talk about the role millennials can play in the fight.

Lynn, who has both a law degree from Georgetown University and a theology degree from Boston University, starting out working at the national office of the United Church of Christ, and also served as legislative counsel for the Washington office of the American Civil Liberties Union.

He has also authored a number of books — including his latest: *God & Government: Twenty-Five Years of Fighting for Equality, Secularism, and Freedom Of Conscience.* And, he is the winner of many national awards, including the Freedom of Worship Award from the Roosevelt Institute and the American Humanist Association's Religious Liberty Award.

Updates From Our JCS Classrooms

Kindergarten/1st Grade – Rachel Norman

The K-1 class learned about *tzedakah* (charity/justice) and doing a *mitzvah* (good deed). The students played "follow the leader" and read *Golda's First Crusade* about the true story of former Israeli Prime Minister Golda Meir's childhood in the U.S. and her efforts to raise money to buy books for her needy classmates.

We discussed what makes someone a good leader and each child made their own *tzedakah* box. Then the class read *It's a Mitzvah*, *Grover* and watched a clip from Shalom Sesame. Students shared their opinion on whether they thought it was better to give *tzedakah* or to do a *mitzvah*.

The class will be learning about Tu Bishvat and some green inventions from Israel. They will read *Joseph Had a Little Overcoat* and do a project with recycled materials. The class will also participate in Machar's community service project, and Machar will hold a Tu Bishvat seder.

2nd Grade – Rebecca Bauer

The second graders began discussing Tu Bishvat, which we will be celebrating during our next class. To begin, we talked about the phrase *Bal Tashchit*, which means "don't waste or destroy."

The class connected the sentiment to Tu Bishvat by noting that we shouldn't waste or destroy trees. Next we read, *Sammy Spider's first Tu B'shevat*, which introduces the idea of eating fruits in honor of the holiday. We watched a fun song about fruits that come from Israel, and then everyone broke into pairs to participate in a contest to think of as many fruits as they could, followed by rounds of brainstorming vegetables, trees/flowers and animals.

After thinking of all of the wonderful things we get from nature, we transitioned to discussing how we can better protect it. We watched this video on Tu Bishvat, which offers ideas for helping the environment and then we read *The Lorax*. I offered the class a few ideas for how we can share this knowledge with the community next time at the community Seder, and they were excited by the idea of making posters that offer suggestions on protecting the environment.

Please plan to stay a bit after 11:30 to join us at the Tu Bishvat Seder and view the posters they will be creating during class!

3rd Grade - Freilich

The third graders have been delving deeper into Jewish history, learning about the historical events behind Hannukah and covering major Jewish thinkers like Maimonides and his impact on western culture at large.

We have spent quite a bit of time covering forced Hellenization and learning about the difference between holding an identity and complete assimilation.

Going forward we will continue with Jewish history and what it means to be Jewish.

4th Grade – Noa Banayan

Today in class, we reviewed all of the Hebrew letters that the students already know and did a few exercises with them. We also learned the letters *vav* and *tet* and a new yowel.

After Hebrew, we read the story *Zvuvi's Israel*, about a fly who travels all over Israel. They were all really engaged and interested in the story and in talking about Israel, and all expressed an interest in wanting to learn more about the country. I asked them for homework to talk to their parents about Israel and come back to class with three things they did not know about Israel and would like to share with the class. I also told them they should feel free to look things up online or in books if they wanted to.

After that discussion, we read a little on Tu Bishvat and talked about what this holiday means and what we can do to celebrate it. I told them I would come up with a Tu Bishvat activity for next class as it falls on the holiday. If I have your permission, next class I would like to use their 10 minutes of outdoor time to clean up the playground for

Tu Bishvat. I'll bring trash bags and gloves so they won't have to actually touch any trash. If you have any issues with this, please write me and we can definitely work around it or without it! Another part of their homework is to come to class with three facts about Tu Bishvat or three ideas on how to celebrate it/clean up the environment.

Next class I'm going to assign them the book *Dreams in the Golden Country: The Diary of Zipporah Feldman* and we are going to discuss Jewish immigration more in depth, back on the same kind of themes as with the last book they read, *Letters from Rifka*.

5th Grade – Heather Gale

The fifth grade class is learning about Israel. Some of the students already knew quite a bit about Israel, and some knew very little. The class saw a map of the country and they searched for different cities and talked about the different parts of the country. Heather brought in some photos from the last time she was there and shared them with the class.

After our Israel discussion, the students tried writing Hebrew. The students looked through some books with Hebrew words and wrote them down in script. They were asked to create a story based on some of the words they were able to find in their books. As always, they came up with some very creative stories!

At the end of class they sang the song "Salaam," which they said they sing at all synagogue events ... yet no one knew the words! We went over the lyrics and attempted to sing, but I think we'll be learning this song again next time to get some more practice in. For those who are not familiar with the song, there are only a few lines and it's in English, Hebrew and Arabic, and is a song about peace.

6th Grade – Sarah Jill Bashein

The sixth graders talked about the first three chapters of *The Devil's Arithmetic* and had some good discussions about it. Henry talked about his current events topic, which was the earthquake/North Korea event. We finished reviewing Christianity, and ended by practicing Hebrew.

During next week's class we'll be discussing Islam, chapters 4 and 5 from *The Devil's Arithmetic*, reviewing Hebrew, and Anika will be talking about her current events topic.

B'nei Mitzvah Class – Shel Lyons

Some students had mentioned feeling disconnected from Judaism, so the class had a chance to discuss what they love about Jewish values and how Jewish values help them become the humanitarian that they want to be as they grow older.

We discussed *tzedakah* (charity), environmentalism, community, rituals (*shiva*), Jewish food, etc. AND they had a chance to discuss the issues with Judaism (whether it was sexism in history or organized religion in general or lack of racial diversity or laws surrounding *kashrut*) and how to resolve those issues (continuing to push progress in Judaism, avoiding downfalls of organized religion, encouraging more diversity, making amends with *kashrut*, etc).

Then, the class had a chance to learn about an alternative — Pastaforianism & the Flying Spaghetti Monster — every student got to try out Pastaforianism with a colander on the head. In the end, I think everyone agreed that you can have a wry sense of humor and still prefer Judaism over Pastaforianism. Each student should have taken home a sheet with their loves for Judaism on one side and their issues with Judaism on the other.

Next week, we'll focus a lot more on the Environmentalism value of Judaism as we celebrate the "New Year for the Trees" (also known as Tu Bishvat). Also, we are arranging a local J Street youth speaker (current college student) to come and share more about their experiences on campus so our students know about their options after high school.


Rabbi Nehama Benmosche – Wonder, Humor and Inspiration: The Sunday Assembly Movement
