Rabbinical Candidate Jeremy Kridel Visiting Machar in March & April 2017

This year's Machar Passover seder, (Sunday, April 9, 4:30 p.m., Cedar Lane UU Church) renowned for its fabulous community-provided food, will be officiated by Jeremy Kridel, a rabbinical student of our own International Institute for Secular Humanistic Judaism. Kridel is a resident of Indianapolis, Indiana; coeditor of "Humanistic Judaism;" an attorney with the Indiana Court of Appeals; and teacher at the IU Kelley School of Business in Indianapolis. He is also married and the parent of a pre-teen diagnosed with autism.

We were also fortunate to have Kridel speak at Machar Adult Education on Sunday, March 26 on the topic of "The Bread of Affliction: Inclusion at the Seder Table." In his presentation, Kridel applied the Passover Haggadah's opening inclusive Passover message to other areas of our lives, leading a discussion of our obligations as Humanistic Jews to ensure everyone has an opportunity to participate in our communities as equals.

In March Kridel also served as the SHJ HuJews Teen Conclave rabbi. This year's conclave was held in Washington, D.C. on March 24 – 26.

One of his rabbinical teachers and advisors Rabbi Miriam Jerris of the Society for Humanistic Judaism says, "Jeremy, for all his talent, is understated. His clear thinking and genuine caring for people makes him a great friend and co-worker, and will make him an exceptional rabbi."

Amit Hanadari-Levy, a Machar teen and 10th grader at Walter Johnson High School, will be competing in April in Baltimore for the US Division I Championship in Fencing. Amit practices every day to reach her current level of success.

And, she is now raising funds to support her plans to be part of the US team at the Maccabi games in Israel. Maccabiah 20 will be held this July. The event is held every four years, originally every three years, since 1932, with over 78 countries now competing. It is open to all Jewish athletes as well as Israelis of all religions.

Here is a description in Amit's words:

"I am a saber fencer from the DC area. I am so excited to represent the USA and especially my own community in the Maccabiah games this summer. This will be especially important to me because I have close family in Israel who will have a chance to see me fence.

Jack Schwartz – "Not Only Merely Dead, She's Really Most Sincerely Dead": The Unsettled Definition of Death

Machar Board member Jack Schwartz will discuss the boundary between life and death according to Judaism and other traditions. He will also talk about increasing societal resistance to the expert consensus, enacted into law, that death includes "brain death." Jack, a lawyer and bioethicist, spent most of his career in the Maryland Attorney General's Office, currently teaches at the University of Maryland's Carey School of Law, works as a clinical ethicist, and is a member of several ethics committees.

The Jewish Coalition for Disaster Relief was established in the early 1990s and has responded to more than two dozen global emergencies and crises. Recant holds a Ph.D in Political Science from George Washington University.

Walk ½ mile north on 355, right on Cedar, 0.7 miles, or Ride-On Bus #34 (ask the driver).

"JPDS" is the site of our Jewish Cultural School (JCS). 6045 16th Street, NW, Washington, DC.

Metro: Red Line to Silver Spring. S-2 or S-4 bus to Federal Triangle to Military Road and cross 16th Street. JCS and Adult Ed begin promptly at 10 a.m.; please arrive early.
